Roll of Honour.

IT is once more our sad duty to record the names of a large number of Old Boys who have fallen in battle. Amongst them are several who especially distinguished themselves in the corporate life of the School, and who displayed in the army the spirit of devotion to duty and the power of adapting themselves to circumstances which they had acquired as leaders among their schoolfellows.

LIEUT. J. E. APPEYARD, M.C., R.E. (1915, Brown's), Athletic Champion 1914, 1915, matriculated with honours 1913, Captain of the School 1915, gained the fifth place in the Woolwich entrance examination, February, 1915, received his commission in October, and went to the front in the following June. He was awarded the Military Cross in January, 1917, gazetted Lieutenant from July, 1917, and was killed in action on April 26th, 1918.

2ND LIEUT. H. BUTLER (1914, Tulley's), Captain of the School Shooting Eight, entered the Civil Service on leaving school. He joined the R.A.F. and was a conscientious, fearless and ready airman. He was killed in Italy when engaged in a bombing raid over the Austrian lines.

R. C. S. DAVIES (1907, Tulley's), 2nd Lieut., 1/17th London Regt., was killed near St. Quentin, on March 21st, 1918.

W. H. GRACE (1907), Corpl., Artists' Rifles, killed in action.

J. D. HALSEY (1915, Tulley's), Pte., 7th London Regt., fell in action April 16th, 1918. He was an impulsive, warm-hearted boy, popular with everybody.

TOM C. HARTLEY (1901), Armourer Staff-Sergt., A.O.C., enlisted in August, 1914, and saw much service. He died on April 5th, 1918, of wounds received on March 26th.

LEONARD W. KINGSWELL (1914, Spurgeon's), Capt., Hampshire Regt., joined the London Scottish in the early days of the war. He was then gazetted to the Hampshires, and displayed the same qualities of practical intelligence and resource which had distinguished him when captain of his house. He won distinction as a bombing officer. He was killed in action at Méricourt, on March 25th, 1918.

W. LE GROVE (1906), 2nd Lieut., 12th London Regt., enlisted in August, 1914, was sent abroad almost

immediately, gained a commission and was killed in France on April 24th, 1918.

D. W. LEMAN (1907), Lieut., 21st London Regt., was reported "missing" for some time, and is now reported to have fallen in Palestine.

F. H. MARTIN, M.C. (1912, Brown's), Lieut., Coldstream Guards, was killed in action at Boisy St. Martin, on March 28th, 1918. He went from Alleyn's to Charterhouse in 1912.

A. C. PATERSON (1915, Cribb's), 2nd Lieut., Durham Light Infantry, left school at seventeen to join the Army and went out to France as soon as he was old enough. He was killed on April 22nd, 1918, near Bouzincourt, and is buried in the English cemetery there. At the time of his death he was serving as a Lewis Gun and Intelligence Officer.

H. S. PLANT (1890), Lieut. R.E., who took part in the South African War, died on service of pneumonia, February 18th, 1918.

H. J. STIDWILL (1899), 2nd Lieut., Royal Berkshire Regt., who was reported missing in 1916, is now reported to have been killed at that time.

REGINALD TOON (1900), Pte., Royal Sussex Regt., joined the Army in 1914, and was killed in France, June 30th, 1916.

BROOKE K. WILLIS (1915, Cribb's), Pte., Lincoln Regt., who enlisted under age and was sent home for another six months before going to the front, was killed by a sniper April 17th, 1918.

Among those reported missing is Rifleman F. J. R. Poynor (Cribb's), who was with a Lewis Gun section of the Queen's Westminsters, cut off by the Germans at Gavrelle, near Arras, on March 28th. Any information as to his fate will be gratefully received by his father, Mr. G. E. Poynor, 11, Perry Vale, Forest Hill, S.E.

The late Rev. Joseph Henry Smith.

WHEN Mr. Smith came to Dulwich in 1875, he came as Head Master of the Lower School of Dulwich College, then a small affair of about 100 boys and twelve Foundation scholars, having its home in the buildings on the west side of the quadrangle in the Village.

For some years after this the Lower School had a very precarious existence, and Mr. Smith experienced many an anxious day before he saw his efforts successful in putting the institution upon a stable and independent foundation; but in 1882 a

new scheme was passed which provided for the erection of a permanent building—to be known as Alleyn's School—in the Townley Road, adapted to meet modern requirements and capable of expansion.

This building was ready for its occupants in 1887, and thither the boys gathered from several temporary buildings in the village, and now numbering some 400, migrated in September of that year. The new school that provided accommodation for 600 boys was soon full to its utmost capacity, and for a town school, its delightful situation, its spacious playing fields—then of thirteen acres—and the first-class secondary school education to be obtained within its walls, have given it such advantages that its popularity has been maintained unchecked and a long waiting list of boys anxious to fill vacant places is characteristic of its normal condition.

Looking back one can see how well and wisely the foundation for a good school, worthy of its Founder's intentions, were laid—a result which was due in very large measure to the watchful care of its first Head Master, who, when he resigned in 1902, was able to hand over to his successor what the Government Inspector of that day described as a “goodly heritage.”

In his day and generation Mr. Smith was a very good and highly successful Head Master, a master of his craft, ruling firmly but without asperity, careful over the little things that mattered, while taking long views and anticipating the (fundamental) changes that were looming above the educational horizon.

For an instance of this one can point to his keen interest in the teaching of science in school, to the thought lavished upon the provision of a well-equipped physics laboratory in which the theories of the classroom could be practically demonstrated, and to the planning of an equally well-equipped counterpart for chemistry. Ever since that time Alleyn's has taken a foremost place among the schools of the country for the excellence of its science work.

Then again, highly appreciative of the value of music in the education of the boys committed to his care, he devoted much time, much thought and much talent—he was an excellent singer, and an excellent judge of boys' voices—to its cultivation, and the Alleyn's School Concerts obtained a reputation which was more than local.

He was, further, very fond of flowers, and this love of his not only displayed itself at Cedar House, but brought its influence to bear upon the School, where the planting of trees and the

filling of the flower beds have added to the amenities of the place, which, so far as its architectural features are concerned, were and are still somewhat lacking.

It must have been gratifying for him to know in his distant home, that in all three respects—in science, in music, and in the beautifying effect of the flowers—his early labours have been followed so that they have become characteristic features of the place.

Above all, it must have been a great pleasure to him to realise that thousands of young fellows, well equipped mentally, morally and physically, had gone forth to do battle with the problems of life inspired by the lessons they had learnt in the School over which he had presided so long and so successfully.

Editorial.

THE day on which we commemorate Edward Allyn, our Founder and Benefactor, has ever been a red-letter day for past and present members of Allyn's School. Many and varied have been the modes of celebrating Founder's Day, but it has always been the day on which we welcome back the Old Boys to their Alma Mater, and to all the pleasant associations of the past. In fact, it can be said, that it is essentially Old Boys' Day.

Formerly, it was customary to throw open the school buildings for inspection, and to exhibit apparatus and work prepared by the boys of the school. This fact invariably drew a goodly number of visitors, mostly parents and relatives, who were rightly very much pleased with their sons' handiwork. Unfortunately, some time before the war, this feature of Founder's Day had to be cancelled owing to the activities of the militant suffragists.

But, undoubtedly, the cricket matches were the chief feature of Old Boys' Day. These games, which were arranged between the School and the Old Boys used to rouse us to a great pitch of excitement and enthusiasm. After the cricket matches came a short *al fresco* concert, and then the climax of the day was reached when, about nine o'clock, the gymnasium was cleared, and the rest of the evening devoted to dancing.

Thus did we celebrate Founder's Day in the good old times; but now the war has shorn the day of all its former glories. In 1918 the merry throngs of Old Boys and their friends were no longer to be seen. Gone, too, were all the festivities, the concerts

and the dancing; the cricket matches alone remained, and here, too, we observed the changes that the war had wrought; for the Old Boys, in order to complete their teams, were obliged to enlist the help of parents of present boys of the School, and of several of the masters, who seemed to be getting a little preliminary training, previous to their calling-up under the next Military Service Act.

During the cricket matches a war time tea was provided for us in the Buttery, and we tried hard to imagine that our tea contained sugar, and that we were not rationed as to the number of pieces of bread-and-butter we might consume. But all food questions were forgotten in the all-engrossing gossip that goes on when past and present members of Alleyn's meet together.

We have to regret the fact that so few Old Boys were able to attend this year. Many, we know, are away on Active Service, and some who were present last year will, unhappily, never be with us again. Let us hope that by Founder's Day, 1919, the war may be over, and that the School will be able to welcome back the Old Boys, which it is ever ready to do, whether they come on Founder's Day or at any other time.

ON Founder's Day, June 22nd, was held in the College Chapel for the first time in the history of Almeyn's School, a corporate Communion for the whole School. Although the numbers were not great, they yet justified the holding of the service, and it is to be hoped that the precedent set up will be followed. The Almeyn War Fund benefited by the offertory.

ON Old Boys' Day this year, June 22nd, two games of thirteen a side were played between Old Boys (including masters and fathers of present boys) and School. Scores will be found elsewhere.

At the Commemoration Service in the College Chapel on June 23rd, at 4 p.m., there was a fairly large congregation, consisting of Governors, and representatives of the College, Almeyn's School, and James Allen's Girls' School—Almeyn's, we may say, was *not* very well represented.

The sermon was preached by the Master of Dulwich, Mr. G. Smith. The order of the service was the same as that used for several years past, the addition of drums and brass to the organ in the hymns and gloria being very effective.

HEARTIEST congratulations to H. P. J. Clark on being awarded the M.P.'s prize.

WE regret that, owing to a printer's error, the fact that H. A. Reid passed the London Matriculation in January, 1917, was omitted in our farewell to him.

It is our sad duty to record the death at Almeyn House, Worthing, of the Rev. Joseph Henry Smith, who for twenty-seven years, 1875 to 1902, was the first Head Master of the School.

He died suddenly on June 27th, and was buried at Broadwater, Worthing, on Tuesday, July 2nd, having survived Mrs. Smith for a short six months. At the funeral the Governors were represented by Mr. Brading, and the School by Mr. Marsland.

The sympathy of generations of Old Boys who passed under his care, and were able to appreciate the kindly interest he always displayed in their welfare, and of his many friends in Dulwich,

will go out wholeheartedly to Dr. H. Milbank Smith and his sister in the loss that has befallen them.

A brief survey of his work will be found elsewhere.

WE deeply regret to learn that Mr. George Crispe Whitely has died at his house, The Chestnuts, Dulwich Common, after an illness of four months. He was born in 1845, and was educated at Mill Hill, Clapham Grammar School, and St. John's College, Cambridge, where he was President of the Union, and took his degree in 1868.

Called to the Bar at the Middle Temple in 1870, Mr. Whitely was appointed deputy clerk of the peace for Surrey after practising two years, and in the following year clerk to the justices of the Newington division, a post he held for forty-five years. For nearly fifty years he had taken a keen and active interest in the local government of Camberwell and South London, and had especially devoted himself to education, being for many years a Governor of the College, a member of the London School Board, and an almoner of Christ's Hospital.

WE very deeply sympathise with Mr. and Mrs. Kingswell on the loss of their only son, killed in action.

A LARGE number of books have recently been added to the School Library. They include a valuable collection, which we owe to the kindness of Mrs. Reginald Smith and of Mrs. Yates Thompson, who acted as the intermediary. To them the librarian tenders his heartiest thanks on behalf of the School.

The Athletic Sports.

WHY WE SHOULD DEBATE.

Boys are not naturally thoughtful beings, nor can they reasonably be expected to be thoughtful, for they are very seldom forced to think for themselves. Necessity is not only the mother of invention, but of most other forms of thought. Boys, like the lilies of the field, are fed and clothed without trouble to themselves. They are not required to choose either their parents, their name, or their school; nor, at school, what or how they will learn, nor even what games they will play or at what times. All these things and many more are arranged for them by well-meaning people. The consequence is that boys take everything for granted, and, having so little freedom, enjoy themselves as much as possible, without bothering their heads about anything under the sun. Some of the subjects which they study at School might well provide matter for thought; but they appeal mainly to an academic interest, and thought can only flourish in the air of freedom, in which human beings have to make vital decisions for themselves and for others. Moreover, genuine thought moves slowly, and the first object of the school curriculum is to acquire so much knowledge in so little time. It is only natural, therefore, that at school boys believe what they are told without much examination, and seldom learn to look around them with critical and inquiring eyes.

Yet education is a failure unless it produces thoughtful men and women, interested in every important question of the time, anxious above all things to distinguish truth from falsehood, what is just from what is unjust. Next to winning the war, such citizens are the first need of the time, more important to the country by far than scientists, engineers, or up-to-date business men. For good or for evil, England is now definitely committed to democracy, and this means that all great fundamental questions must be settled by the widest public opinion. For many years after the war such important problems will be arising for solution, and great demands will be made which, unless heard with sympathy and settled with justice, will plunge the whole country into disunion and chaos. No one can play his part in these times if he accepts the opinions of his elders; for the

latter are biased by partizanships of the past, and cannot readily adapt their minds to new needs and changed conditions. All questions must be genuinely studied by the young, and judged on their merits : that is their duty and their privilege.

For these reasons, anything that will induce boys to think about the questions of the time is of the first importance in a school, and all serious people will rally to its support. A debating society may be of the greatest value, provided it has the right spirit and aspirations. Come therefore to debate, not in a mood of contention, but ready to give due weight to facts. Pay no respect to persons, and esteem only opinions which you may judge to be founded on justice and magnanimity.

Cadet Corps.

ON Wednesday, May 8th, a sports meeting was organised by the Southern Counties Cross Country Association. There were two long-distance races : first, a four-mile run for teams of soldiers followed by a two-mile run, open to Cadet Corps, which started to the right of the grandstand and included the Derby racecourse. In the latter race the teams, which were sent off at two-minute intervals, each consisted of six boys.

Our A team came in first in the following order : G. V. Constantinidi, S. B. Lewis, A. O. C. Hood, H. L. Murché, R. E. Quarterman, L. C. F. Hood. The following is the order of our B team, which came a good third to Wilson's second : C. F. Davey, A. B. Clifford, A. V. Randall, D. L. C. Smith, P. A. Florence, R. B. Nancarrow. The first four in the A team received silver medals, and in the B team, bronze medals.

The fourth man's time was taken in each case, Murche's time being 13 mins. 1 sec., and Smith's, 13 mins. 36 secs.

On Empire Day, May 24th, a contingent of fifty, accompanied by Capt. Evans and Lieut. Hack, represented the corps at a

parade in Hyde Park. There were roughly 1,200 cadets on parade, and when they marched off they presented a fine sight.

After the parade, the contingents, headed by the fifes and drums, and pipes and drums, of the Brigade of Guards, marched to the Albert Hall, where a concert was given by the K.K. Empire Association to wounded soldiers, and boys and girls of London secondary schools who either had relatives now serving, or lost in the war. Alleyn's was represented by 150 boys, accompanied by six masters. The cadets were to act as a Guard of Honour to T.M. the King and Queen, who honoured us with their presence.

The concert, which included orchestral selections, conducted by leading musicians of the day, solos, and choruses, was thoroughly enjoyed by all, the most effective and well-received "turn" being the march from one end of the hall to the other of a fife and drum band of each of the regiments of guards; the Scots substituted pipes for fifes. Every one took part in the singing most lustily when called upon to do so, particularly when the National Anthem was sung. A modern miracle was worked for us, when there flashed upon the screen kinematograph pictures of our march through London, and of the arrival of their Majesties two hours previously. This was cheered most heartily.

The Alleyn's School War Memorial.

THE accompanying copy of the appeal for subscriptions towards raising a War Memorial to the Memory of the Old Boys of the School who have fallen in the war is self-explanatory of the origin and progress of the movement, and needs no further explanation.

In taking this step we are, of course, only marching in line with the great public and secondary schools of the country, and a comparison of our aims with theirs will certainly not leave us open to the charge of being too ambitious.

The committee is a strong and representative one, and should command the confidence of all Old Boys. At a meeting held in the School Hall on April 10th, 1918, it was decided that a War Memorial should be erected to the memory

of the Old Boys of Allevyn's School who have fallen in the war. Various suggestions were made as to the form this should take, and a proposal was submitted in favour of building an Organ behind the platform in the School Hall.

It was considered by the meeting almost unanimously that an Organ would strongly appeal not only to the present and future boys of the School, who will assemble daily in the Hall for morning prayers, but also to Old Boys, who find the Hall their centre of interest when they visit the School. The woodwork would contain panels, which would be decorated with an appropriate scroll; on them would be inscribed the names of all the Old Boys who have died for their King and Country. The Organ would further be a most valuable acquisition for Prize Day ceremonies, School concerts, and other public functions.

A design has been prepared by EDWIN T. HALL, Esq., F.R.I.B.A., who has generously offered his services gratuitously as architect.

A Committee has been formed, representative of all the interests involved, and their names are annexed to this circular.

The sum of at least £2,000 will be necessary for the above Memorial.

If funds permit, an additional Memorial will subsequently be placed in a prominent position in the School grounds.

“Alleyn's” Exhibitions.

THESE are awarded annually to boys who are leaving for “places of higher education.”

At present the annual value of the Exhibition is not less than £20 and not more than £50, and they are tenable for not more than four years.

The regulations under which they are awarded are as follows:—

Qualifications of Candidates.

The Candidates shall be boys who are being, and for not less than three years have been, educated at Alleyn's School.

They shall have obtained First Class Honours, with at least one distinction, in the Oxford or Cambridge Junior Local Examination, or

They shall have passed the Oxford or Cambridge Senior Local Examination before reaching the age of 16 years, or

They shall have passed the Matriculation Examination of the London University before reaching the age of 17 years.

They shall have obtained a favourable report from the Head Master as to character and conduct.

Examinations.

These Exhibitions shall be awarded by the Governors, subject to the recommendation of the Head Master, on the results of the Annual School Examination at Midsummer, or of a special examination held for the purpose; any successes obtained in previous Public Examination being taken into consideration in each case.

Educational Establishments for which they are available.

Any Teaching University of the United Kingdom,

Medical School or Technical School,

Any other place of higher education sanctioned by the Governors.

Conditions on which they may be determined.

The Governors have power to determine an Exhibition if in their judgment the holder thereof is guilty of serious misconduct or idleness, or fails to maintain a reasonable standard of proficiency, or wilfully ceases to pursue his education; or for such other reasons as they may think sufficient.

Foundation Scholarships.

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THE College Governors provide annually a sum of money which covers the Tuition fees of about twenty Alleyn's Foundation Scholars.

Three Entrance Scholarships, tenable in the first instance for three years, will usually be awarded each year to boys over twelve and under fourteen years of age on 31st July, who have been educated elsewhere than at a Public Elementary School. Application should reach the Head Master before March 1st. The Examination is conducted by the Joint Scholarships Board. This award is suspended during the continuance of the War.

Dulwich College Scholarships.

—:—

THE College Governors will give one Scholarship every year, tenable at Dulwich College for boys who are being and have been for not less than two years educated at Alleyn's School.

The award will be made on the result of the Annual Examination of the School in July. Candidates for this Scholarship must be under fifteen years of age on the 31st of July, and must give in their names to the Headmaster on or before the 1st of July. All Candidates will be required to have done at least one year's Latin at Alleyn's School.

The value of the Scholarship is £27 per annum, and covers the tuition fees at the College. A further sum of not more than £5, to be found by the parents, will suffice to pay all extras. The Scholarship is tenable for four years, with possible extension for one or more years, in the case of very promising boys.

It is primarily meant for boys who wish to go to the University or into some profession which involves an education of a more classical nature than that given at Alleyn's School. There will not, however, be any rule binding a successful candidate to take up any particular branch of education or profession.

If a London County Council Junior Scholar gains this Scholarship he will have to give up his L.C.C. Scholarship, as the latter may not be held at the College.

The parents of the candidate to whom the Scholarship is awarded must at once apply to the School Secretary, Dulwich College, for an admittance application form and prospectus, and must state that the boy is the holder of the Alleyn's School Scholarship.
